The Voice of the Eternal Steppe A Fine Arts Exhibit

In October, fourteen Kazakh and American artists graced the West Side Arts Coalition with their finely executed, accomplished paintings, ceramics and sculptures. Curated by Berik Kulmamirov and Leila Elias, the exhibit whetted my appetite to learn more about Kazakhstan.

The Kazakh and American artists exhibiting at the WSAC, provided viewers with rich narratives about Kazakhstan. The paintings, which were mostly oils, and all work primarily realistic, rather than non-objective abstracts, informed viewers about the rich Kazakh culture and history.

Talgat Tleuzhanov, a rising star in the art world of his country, exhibited three paintings at the WSAC. He received extensive classical training in St. Petersburg, Russia and his work, the most well-known, the monumental, historical "Battle of Ortrar," can be found in the Kazakh National Museum. In our gallery he showed, "Queen Tamiris," "Summer Taste," and "Moon Night." His painting, "Queen Tamiris," depicted the ancient Scythian queen who took revenge on the Persian emperor, Cyrus II, who had defeated the Scythians in battle. Tleughanov depicted Queen Tamiris with incisive, energetic brushstrokes and a masterful palette. He showed the Queen triumphant on horseback through highly dramatic, gestural rendering.

The master ceramicist and sculptor, **Askar Nartov**, exhibited numerous ceramic bone china plates using the time honored DECOL technique along with two bronze and one epoxy sculpture. All were representative of the nomadic Kazakh culture. The plate, "The Koumiss," depicted a young Kazakh woman offering Koumiss, a drink of fermented mare's milk, to perhaps a traveler appearing at her family yurt. The yurt is the nomadic home that can be assembled on the steppe in hours and is folded up to be transported to different locations as the Kazakh herders follow their flocks. Among the plates, Nartov also showed, "The Kobyz," the traditional stringed instrument played by the Kazak people that is bowed like a violin and has a sound similar to a viola or cello. Nartov told me the DECOL technique has a long history and is characterized by the transfer of a drawing in mineral paints from silk or paper onto the bone china surface and then fired to a beautiful luster.

Bahytnur Burdeshekov displayed two oil paintings. His semi-abstract work charged the painting surfaces with an almost cubist sensibility. One piece, "Evening Melodie," showed a woman in sepia tones, playing a kobyz and sitting by the roadside on the endless steppe, resting in the evening heat, after arduously traveling long distances between far flung villages on the plain. She plays for a bit of water or money; she plays for survival. This was the most abstract piece in the show and the faceted brushstrokes swirl around a suggested figure in motion, causing the viewer to almost hear the sounds of the notes bursting forth from the instrument.

Michael Prettyman exhibited two finely executed oils both depicting birds. The artist told me one painting, of a white falcon, was his fantasy, as this bird does not exist. Its mythological purity stands in contrast to the golden eagle, shown in his other oil. They were opposite images, the falcon, one of peace and the eagle, the predator, a warlike symbol. Prettyman had visited Kazakhstan and was impressed by the elegance and equanimity of the Kazakh people. He loved his time there and wants to return. (Continued on Page 3)

Pete Diedrich painted an owl in flight. Done in oil on board, the bird showed its marvelous wingspan as it swept down, perhaps trying to score a kill. We don't know where the bird will land; we can only see it winging its way above the prairie.

Dosbol Kassymov delighted the viewer with his paintings, "Alma-Ata," and "Meeting." In "Alma-Ata," the artist depicted a huge, delicious Almaty Aport apple. Kassymov wanted to evoke a happy memory of his father in the painting. The piece shows an elderly man in traditional dress, bringing a huge apple on a sled to the city. It is winter; snow is falling and the man arduously pulls the apple along. Historically, the Almaty Aport apple was large with a very sweet flavor. In the 21st century, these apples are a memory.

Adam Cross gave us his version of a Kazakh courtship ritual in "The Kissing Game," an oil on canvas. The players on horseback were depicted intersecting at high speeds with the woman's arm raised about to strike her suitor with the whip if the man was unable to "catch" her. The figures and horses, portrayed with tremendous movement, showed the man pretending to evade the strokes of the woman's lash.

Many artists in the show used the geographical steppe as the most important backdrop for their work.

This was clearly shown in **Berik Kulmamirov**'s paintings, "Aral, Dance without Melody," and "Last Breath." To me, Kulmamirov gave underlying messages in his pieces. "Aral, Dance without Melody," was somewhat surrealistic with a ballerina, grand piano and penguin superimposed on a background of dry steppe with camels. At first the subject matter seemed out of place, but, I think Kulmamirov was commenting on the imposition of Russian culture on the people of the steppe and also, the ecological damage Soviet collectivization caused to the Aral Sea. In "Last Breath," the painter depicted an eagle with his Kazakh handler in the background, about to swoop down to kill his prey, a wolf running from this majestic bird. The wolf terrorizes wildlife and flocks on the steppe and the herdsmen are happy to keep this predator at bay.

Erbol Khamirov painted an idyllic scene, "Morning on the Steppe," along with an intriguing oil, "Conversation." In the former, it is dawn and the people are just awakening near their yurts. A light stream of smoke, almost tangible, rises from a cooking fire in the distance as people slowly come to life. The palette's colors are beautifully muted and the artist subtly depicts the dawn sunlight as it breaks through the clouds. The painting, "Conversation," shows two Kazakh horsemen, near the Tien Shen Mountains, in deep discussion. The traditional nomads were known to go out separately from everyone if they were having a disagreement. Away from the settlement, they could sit on horseback,

talk, and resolve any problems peacefully amid the calming influence of nature.

Meyrzhan Nurgozhin presented two very contrasting works. One, entitled, "Nostalgie," showed two boys on a fence with one child playing a shepherd's flute, in a stance as if on horseback, atop a traditional textile draped over the fence, conjuring up the nomadic spirit. A bag of apples was hung from the fence post, as if it were a traditional bag found in a yurt. It is a painting of longing by the artist for the nomadic life. His other painting, "Reincarnation," brilliantly fools the viewer's eye wherein when the painting is seen from one angle it depicts the eagle in flight and when turned to another angle, the regal bird morphs into a nomadic warrior. All is masterfully done with energetic brushstrokes and a tension between strong imagery and subtlety of form.

In **Leila Elias** lovely painting, "Blondy Girl on the Steppe," the artist portrayed a young girl gazing at a fawn. In the background are yurts with elders minding children playing nearby. It is spring on the steppe and the painting is diffused with sunlight. Elias brings to the viewer a scene of innocent, nomadic life, ecologically pure, before modernization.

Janet A. Cook painted a young Kazakh woman in her oils, "Daybreak," and "Twin-Study." She also showed along with the paintings, a drawing of the same girl. In "Daybreak," the girl, wearing traditional dress, holding a bouquet of flowers, is just entering womanhood. Cook told me she painted this work over another painting and applied washes of color, allowing a suggestion of the underlying picture to show through. This gave the composition a sense of tension between the stillness of the figure and the surrounding swirling lines in the ground and much is suggested in economical application.

The exhibition was rounded out by **Colleen Blackard**'s verdant acrylic canvas, simply titled, "Steppe." The artist uses cool blues and greens, bringing this viewer into the unending, lush, grassland. Blackard's piece emphasizes the expansiveness of the steppe and the natural richness of the Kazakh land. Kazakhstan is as big as Western Europe and the prairie covers the land almost endlessly. Cities and settlements rise intermittently out of the rolling steppe. I am told one can travel by horseback or car almost forever, guided only by the sun, moon and stars to the towns spaced distantly between each other. Blackard's painting is not the largest in the exhibit but it made me feel the atmosphere of the land in its fine execution.

"The Voice of the Eternal Steppe" was truly an education for me about a rich culture and history of which I was almost totally ignorant. I am grateful to Berik Kulmamirov and Leila Elias for curating this show and acquainting me with such wonderful artists.
