As a curator, Ayala frames the exhibit, beginning with Carolyn Reus' photos and ending with Amy Rosenfeld-Kass' collages where both artists show works with similar themes. Reus provides a hobgoblinesque mood in the picture of two happy scarecrows by a tree and Jack-o-Lanterns gracing the top of a building entryway; and, to end the show, with the work coming full circle, Ayala, places Rosenfeld-Kass's pieces of bountiful harvest gourds and collaged scarecrows front and center so that both photographers act as bookends for the exhibit.

Joe Giordano provides two exquisite fall works, "Into The Woods," with a star shaped mirror in the center of the photo reflecting the viewer as we decide whether or not to journey into the primeval forest along with a montage of the Celtic god, Cernunnos, protector of fertility and the hunt, who inhabits the photo as a primordial spirit in a secluded arbor.

Bob Merritt, in contrast, brings us to full light, in "GWB Seagulls," where his clever use of the lens captures the seagulls' movements at the George Washington Bridge. The gulls look argumentative as if they are vying for a special morsel floating over the water, jostling each other for position; and this felicitous picture Merritt juxtaposes with a somber view of the original World Trade Center being subsumed in dark clouds, portending the doom to come. In this artist's work, we see a gamut of emotions.

David Reibman takes us to Morroco in his multiple images of one scene in each piece to make the whole composition. "Cyclist and Friends" provides almost abstract minimalist but rich color of yellow wall and blue window austerely contrasted with the warm camaraderie of the cyclist and his companion. The intimacy of these two people sitting on the street differs from the happy contortions of the acrobat on the mosque steps who animates the staid aspects of the religious architecture providing backdrop to the man's athletic performance.

Silvia Soares Boyer shares with us photographs

of the time she spent studying in the UK depicting the sedate grounds of the British Museum juxtaposed with the carnival turnult of Picadilly Circus. To remind us that she hails from Portugal, the artist includes a love letter to her home country in a bright picture of the "Bridge Don Luis I," the structure named after the cultured and popular Portuguese king.

Her husband, **Daniel C. Boyer** provides fleeting glimpses of landscape from scenic countryside that he captures from the window of a train he is riding on in a trip to Rochester. The landscape flies by with mesmerizing fall colors passing before our eyes and a lovely portrait of Silvia, his travel companion, is also included in the group.

Richard Ayala dazzles us by contributing the radiant beauty of a blooming sunflower in an autumn field along with a serene photo of waning golden light, the tranquil dusk falling on a sequestered yard inviting one for a moments' rest in the enchanting twilight hour.

Herb Fogelson has a long history as a professional photographer and one piece he exhibits here is a delightful picture of Ulster County at mid-summer where puffy cumulus clouds floating over gentle fields, just kiss the tip of a mountain. His palette is the scenery near his country home and we are privileged to enjoy some of what his eyes see.

Healer **Laurie Schwartz** captures the mysteries of existence, hidden from the viewer's prosaic sight, as she explores our earth's miniature worlds of wondrous life in beautiful compositions of nature's textures abstracted so that her images express timelessness and visceral force simultaneously, the microcosmic deeply connecting with the cosmic and opening us up to secrecies.

I truly enjoyed the pieces in this exhibit, bringing us some tastes of fall and new experiences to be savored at the WSAC. With the curator infusing novel energies in our organization, I look forward to many inventive forays throughout the year by our wonderful artists.

Here on the west side of Manhattan, there is a new non-profit, largely volunteer, organization entitled New Plaza Cinema, created in response to the closing of the legendary Lincoln Plaza Cinemas. In the past year, New Plaza has been showing the same films that Lincoln Plaza would have shown, but now, in the spacious auditorium of the New York Institute of Technology (NYIT) on Broadway between 61st & 62nd Streets.

As an expression of confidence in the organization, NYIT has provided its facilities for two weekends every month, starting November 2nd to show independent and foreign films up until May 2020. In addition, Harvard Business School Community Partners is collaborating with New Plaza so that eventually they may have a permanent film venue.
