

Silvia Soares Boyer provided two digital prints and an original color photo of outside the British Museum, an artful documentation of her days in the UK. Boyer, known for her cryptic paintings of esoterica, here contributed a different aspect of her abilities to the WSAC in these narrative works.

Daniel C. Boyer praised his muse, Silvia, in a picture of her in Cambridge at Harvard and one of her in Duluth, Minnesota, One photo was an overexposed piece that Daniel chose for the show where Silvia glows from the picture, a unique take on his spouse. Both pictures were done in the cold of winter and Silvia's warmth exudes from them bringing happiness to viewers.

Carolyn Reus added to the exhibit with her pictures of Central Park, one shot of a vivid ice cream truck near The Met that Reus took because the vehicle's colors appealed to her. A real beauty was her digital print, "Sunset in Central Park," serenely capturing our park's loveliness, contrasting with the festiveness of the ice cream truck.

Elissa Marton also celebrated our wonderful park in two very atmospheric photos, one most striking, entitled, "Fog, Central Park," where the lush colors of the trees are juxtaposed with a backdrop of skyscrapers disappearing gradually in low hanging clouds, a thoroughly enjoyable piece.

David Reibman provided chromogenic montages, prints of people and buildings showcasing different aspects of each with three views of the subjects inspirationally arranged across the photos' picture planes.

Leila Elias is not only a talented artist, but her creative abilities also extend to photography, where here, she demonstrates a range of techniques. I particularly liked her piece, "Rain Metallic," a study of water hitting the ground in Central Park where the picture becomes a painterly abstract impression that although I was looking at a photograph, I was reminded of the paint handling of Camille Pissarro.

Eliza McNally's beautiful pictures of Sullivan County conjured up images of the bucolic Catskills where I vacationed when young. The shot of the abandoned bus in the woods along with photos of the area in winter were lead-ups to McNally's strong piece, "Handmaid's Epiphany," a tribute to the author, Margaret Atwood, where saturated red umbrellas dramatically contrasted with their steel gray urban background.

Bob Merritt showed work on film and in digital form. An interesting, idiosyncratic photo was "No Name," that as in the work of Elias, treated the picture as almost an abstract painting in its composition where color moved on the surface in a vortex, creating a dizzying effect.

Dr. Barry Pinchefsky provided a tour-de-force finale in digital print. All pieces were dramatic, two works where I believe the photographer employed telephoto lenses capturing a baseball player in the Bronx along with one of the pounding action of horses racing at Saratoga. These two semi-journalistic works were shown with Pinchefsky's beautiful portrayal of the aura of Dale Chihuly's sculpture where parts of the sparkling glass mesmerized this viewer with blue gestures darting out in space. He also captured a sensitive up-close study of a bird in flight, no small achievement.

As the last exhibit of 2017, this was a great way to end the year. The Boyers knew the strengths of their photographers and produced a cohesive show of appealing work for all to see. I enjoyed it and look forward to more pictorial forays in 2018.
