Despite the title, **Sonia Barnett**'s blue-and-white "Chevron Challenge" contains no chevrons (if not somehow coupled), except, perhaps, their couché suggestion, but this beautiful work, black-diapered like stained glass, resembles misplanned dancetty pallets gone awry at the last moment over very large panes of checky. Echoes of this work's patterning continue into and inside "Perspective"'s large orange border, watercolour-like pink-into-red and green and blue in forests coral-like and interlocking, perhaps of overlapping forms located somewhere between Tanguy and Wifredo Lam. The ultramarine zigzags of "Cool Jazz" dance across a lighter blue surface patterned like wrapping- or wallpaper beneath gold like heavy earrings linked in chain and found on a sidewalk, priceless jewelry worn into our path by time that passes and has passed.

With "The Shopper's Tribute," **Anne Rudder** incorporates the profound poetry typical of her into her work. Red-lettered commentary adorns a white paper bag lined with red tissue paper with white snowflakes, out of which a black flower blows. The sculpture contrasts shockingly with the spooky white-shadow negative cascades of "Mysterious Composites".

Robert Scott has works of an incredible diversity. Two trees that might be at home on the plains of Africa, in Australia or in Gondor ("Arbor Drama I") twist, tortuous against a pale but multicoloured sky. Behind and flanking on one side the sere ochre of "Landscape 3"'s possible autumnal serengeti sprout from ridge or root dark trunks blue- and gesturally-leaved; it is difficult to distinguish this foliage from the cascading sky. In "Best Friend Right" and "Best Friend Left" he shows a pair of genial twins or twinned Border Collies or Border-Collie mixes smiling with great enthusiasm, wearing patterned collars that look like bow-ties with tags like resembling very important medals.

Robin Goodstein employs ("Red Bow"), with painterly expressionism, bright orange patches, and lilac-lavender, and blue, and bleu-celeste, and yellow, with angled blacks-barely-into-navy and smudges and white lines barely smudged into grey and white lines climbing and making a polite diagonal slash across the canvas.

Marianne McNamara's paintings charm with, almost always, a note of humour that can be sharp but not mean. "I'm Out of Here!" may be the exclamation of a smoking runaway bride, packed and seeming to wait before a rank of reedlike saplings. In "Saturday Lunch Pals," men no longer young and caught somewhere between glumness, resignation and suspicion have gathered at their homely, yet vastly overpriced, greasy spoon for their standing date; over their heads is a swordfish breaching his frame.

The dashing energy of **Michael Chamblee**'s coloured- and colourful pen drawings possess sixties' posters' mood without the datedness, flatness or artificiality. With blues rich, dark and medium, and instruments and symbols against salmon and dancing wedges maroon and the grey of silver he conveys the verve of jazz and its sizzle ("Combo"). In "Afternoon Stroll" his urban landscape with climbing, dark fire escape and jewel-like windows finds itself, rather, under a premature chestnut nightfall through which wander dog- and sidewalk-walkers along an avenue plied by a public bus.

Coltrane's face, hand and mouthpiece are dramatically shown by **Nate Ladson** against a black background with the faint quaver of the saxophonist's dynamism. In "Together We Stand," figures that were painted as if in the feeling and sense of a powerful present wait, and appear to recede into the past as they stand further away from dark cascades of rain of dispirited iridescence; hope can, however, not be ruled out. Mr. Ladson's oil on wood, "Friend (They Know No Color)," has two young boys with their backs to the viewer, arms around each other's shoulders, against a field grey in a sense of being unencumbered by the future. His rope bridge in "A View from the Other Side" disappears into the dark, undefined distance of metaphor.

Georgianna Grantham's tall acrylic, "Solar Wind," shows a dotted and planet-like, orange, dwarf sun embedded in snowy space of soft-spiny arcing circles, throwing off slicing cadmium-red buffets and cooler long phthalo-green shields, branches of air which at times bisect each other.

Margarita Ballester works with ink and acrylic and clockwork fans and flowers of wedges of mirror. Her lines, like simple and regularised entopic graphomanias, although with some signs of preparation showing through, hold in pinks and purples and rich golds ("A Reflection in Time"), or are like absent-minded geometrical exercises to draw stars but that went too far ("Messenger of Time"). Over the latter, and ochre, are pressed pollen- and kelly-like blooms and dark flowers with the dried tears of transferring. Her works do not ward off ghosts, as do Ethiopian dresses, but show us ourselves.

Joseph Healy's works ("Memory of History") are often as artifacts on the border between history and prehistory, excavations from a civilization that never existed. They are like layers dug from between subtly-coloured shale's paralyzed crumpling, and with the hard-corduroyed texture of fossil.

The artists of the exhibit's active and compelling expressions together constituted a strong and worthwhile show for West Side Arts Coalition.
