Myrna Harrison Changar presented us "Cherry Blossoms" and "Spring, Riverside Park," two delightful digital prints reflecting an overwhelmingly beautiful and elegant perspective of New York City in springtime.

Helen Levin brought to the gallery an acrylic on canvas entitled "Fervent Verdant." With the chosen colours, this artwork interpreted, with accuracy, of how every rich vegetation is represented with the feeling of a passionate intensity.

By contrast came the paintings of **Lynda Schwartz**, "Plum Road" and "Sea Song." These acrylic/multimedia works, the first with a touch of textures and a certain simplicity, the second arousing a note of beauty and romanticism, have power to sweeten the mind and calm the senses.

Continuing on a path through nature comes our next artist **Helaine Soller**, with "Fish Tales" and "Flowing Sky & Trees." These astonishing acrylics on canvas bring a message of how infinite and yet powerful both Sea and Mother Nature can be, with their creations and changing but always like a rhythmical endless

On the willingness to toast the gallery with a reference to landscapes, came **Erin Butler**. Her "Celadon Bay," an oil on Belgian linen, and "Spring in the Park," an oil on wood, are beautifully represented in warm greenish and pastel-season colors. These paintings bring an interesting rhythm to the composition, letting it breathe in calmness.

The watercolors on paper entitled "Flowers in the Wind 1" and "Flowers in the Wind 2" of **Clarissa Talve** transmitted the spectator to the emanated world of flowers. A fresh vision of living blossoms that with no doubt will scent each alive garden!

Bringing also her love for flowers came our next artist **Judith Van Camp** with an oil on canvas, "Floral in Ceramic Vase," and a mixed media on paper, "Center Stage Orchid 2." The spectator can see the precision of these paintings, and admire the perfect balance between the bizarrely shaped forms and the creativity within.

With the presence of the artist **Marilyn Herbst** came also her "Tefaf Tulip: Red" and "Tefaf Tulip: Yellow." These acrylics inspire with accuracy what we can consider a horticultural land of magnificence. With the presence of both red and yellow colors show us, with no doubt, pure love and cheerful thoughts in perfect harmony.

Deborah Beck surprised me with her pleasurable artworks! Her oils on canvas "Spring Flowering II" and "Heavenly Morning Glories" are an authentic homage to nature. Made with delicate forms of herbs, flowers, trees, it is due admiration to its breathtaking scenery!

Our next artist **Celeste Wiseblood** brought to the gallery two distinct media artworks: the watercolor "Triptych of Angelic Jellyfish, Waterlilies, Spring Flowers," in a enjoyable demonstration of the brush strokes, and a digital photo on canvas "Waterlilies from Brooklyn Botanical Gardens," in a majestic shot, demonstrating with intensity, the freedom and beauty of these creations.

Deborah Dorsey celebrated this exhibit with her two oils. The first painting, "Who's Calling," is an impressive figurative artwork composed with several figures in a coffee-shop chain and with a woman on her cellphone in foreground; the second painting, "Susquehanna Turnpike," is enriched with a strong and powerful creation of the Catskills.

Going forth to the next artist, **Pamela Hawkins** also amazingly brought to us "Seashell Elegy" and "House." These mixed media with the present textures and formations reminds me of how evocative each artwork can be. Either the first, in dark representation, can have a mist of romanticism or the second, with its buildings, represents a perfect harmony of pure and defined lines of construction.

Marie Schepis marked her presence with a beautiful homage to Italy: "Taormina, Sicily" and "Lava Flowers, Mt. Etna." Her two mixed media bring to the horizon a new meaning of this hilltop town on the east coast of Sicily. It sits near Mount Etna, an active volcano with trails leading to the summit. Due to this idea, both paintings gain a new life on texture, structure and visual creations. A landscape singularity of until where imagination can lead you!

Our penultimate artist, **Beatrice Rubel**, presented us with "Rising Color 6" and "Alien Intrusions." These mixed media artworks are a good example of elements and contrast. The first one lives through a soft gradation of colours with the touch of forms that transported me to a mountain scenario; the second one is composed by rounded, curvilinear and pointy forms consolidated in strong colours. The gift of transporting us either into a universe of serenity or into an energizing revelry.

We reach our finale, giving emphasis to artist **Miriam Wills** with her "Daybreak." This mixed media unreels in an abstract style, insignated forms where reds, pinks, browns, among other tints, could have their perfect symbiosis out of a powerful reminiscence.

"Spring Transitions: Color & Shape" was a fantastic way of giving opportunity to fifteen truly talented artists! This genuine exhibition reached its end with "a golden key!" Congratulations to you all who captivated my entire spirit with your art!

Photographs of ethnic jewelry and decorative plates for tables were provided by four artists, **Shokrukh Khamraev**, **Tolib Mukhamedov**, **Latifjon Nazarov**, and **Sayyod Rasulov** with additional pictures by **Bekzot Kobilov** of illustrations of the areas' myths based on Tales of the Arabian Nights. These were lovely juxtapositions with the accompanying well-crafted oil paintings of the hard life on the vast geographic expanses between Europe and China.

The handmade jewelry photographs, provided us with documentations of gold, silver and gem encrusted ornamental objects reflecting Middle Eastern influences as Uzbekistan was part of Persia's empire prior to the twelfth century. Two pictures of hand painted wood plates, embellished with gold leaf nicely complimented the intricate beauty of the jewelry.

Three artists depict musicians in traditional dress playing Kazakh folkloric instruments. Serik Bakhredinov paints an ethereal watercolor of a young woman playing a dombra, finger plucked for its tones, and Bakhytnur Burdesbekov, besides providing the exhibit with a wonderful painting of a serene feline, shows a woman frenetically bowing the gobyz, an ancient stringed instrument, in some of its characteristics, similar to the cello. Painter Burdesbekov has exhibited extensively in the United States and we were happy to see his work here at 96th Street.

The third painter, Saltanat Mirzakhanova shows a painting, entitled, "Dream," where a woman musician, dressed in a traditional red wedding dress, waits for her groom to sweep her off her feet. Mirzakhanova includes a happy touch of sparrows in the piece, indicating the promise of spring and new life.

The home bestowing survival to Steppe people throughout the centuries, the yurt, is painted in its various forms by **Hafis Zaman** and **Karim Bektas**. Bektas is a Mongolian artist with Kazakh roots. His more realistic depiction contrasts with a surrealistic oil, "Levitation of Yurt," where the dwelling launches in a trajectory toward outer space.

Russian **Vasily Zolottsev**, paints husky dogs in the frozen land of Siberia where the artist has his roots. I was told he now lives by the Black Sea where the climate is not so forbidding.

The two curators, Kazakh painter, **Berik Kulmamirov** and American, **Leila Elias**, give us diversity, where Elias renders a beautiful butterfly floating amid mysterious galactic forms and Kulmamirov celebrates his family's rich nomadic heritage in a painting of rural life, entitled, "Shepherd."

A poignant addition to the exhibit is Kulmamirov's portraits of the late Kazakh singer, Batyr, who died young of cardiac arrest. During the time of the exhibit, Kazakh musicians performed this composer's works in tribute to him.

This truly was an exceptional exhibit where the voices of talented people with long cultural roots on this earth fed our souls with a repast of narrative gifts and beauty. The result was rich expressive satisfaction.
