

Daniel C. Boyer's Surrealist paintings are abstract to the last degree but they have a strong emotional quality. All three of these paintings work out of the primary colors of red, yellow, and blue, and yet they lead the viewer into deep silent worlds. "The Support for the Noblemen and the Philosophers" especially brings the viewer into a dream world of phantasmal shapes on a rich black canvas.

Richard Carlson is known for his highly organized works that rely on square and rectangular shapes. In his diptych "Untitled (Gold Teal)" and "Untitled (Blue Green)" he moves into works that rely on color and line in a new way; the two paintings together are geometric, but now diagonal bands of color form overlapping triangles. The paintings are still highly organized in the sense that the three colors really are one color, yellow-green-blue, but within the overall triangle each diagonal band moves to its own vanishing point, and the result is very strong.

Marguerite Borchardt's "Provence Vineyard," "Squirrel Island, ME," "Surf – Port Cros," and "Colza Fields" use the word "reflections" in a unique way. They are all beautifully rendered representational paintings in oil, but the underlying subtext of each is to show how natural light reflects off fields of crops, stones, boulders, and an intriguing architectural farmhouse.

Nate Ladson shows two very different paintings, although both have a sense of deep emotion. "Mood Changes" is an expressive oil painting that represents changes in mood through the use of colors, moving from light and dark purple to orange to red, with shapes of white that seem to be tears dropping into despair. "Double Exposure" is a striking painting of the face of a man, his eyes almost lost in shadow, while the lower two-thirds of his face are sculpted by light almost into abstract forms. Since the face is in close-up, a strong emotion is expressed in the interplay of light and dark in the sculpted forms, echoed by the two highlights that define each eye.

Emily Rich's four abstracts in acrylic or acrylic and collage move with sweeps of bright color across the canvas, in styles of complete abstract expressionism or in certain cases, such as "8x8 Series # 106" the meeting of ocean and land is brought to mind. "Rooftop Series 103" is in watercolor and ink delicately drawn in muted colors, and since it is not completely abstract it shows the compression of the many buildings together that make up a New York street and the viewer can't help but think of the many people in these buildings.

Amy Rosenfeld's "Quilt" is an explosion of exuberant color field painting, with each shape and color precisely placed on the canvas. The abstract "Spring Blossoms" is also precisely painted and shows the warm colors of circular blossoms rising out of winter, which is represented in dark cool colors below.

In **Silvia Soares Boyer**'s "Mysteries of a Crystal Winter" the ice cold white and blue of winter shown in a crystal ball is reflected into the face and arms of the idealized woman holding it. The iciness pervades the picture although it is surrounded by a warm light pink, a paradox. In "Silvia – The Gothic Myself" the artist uses heavy black and blue-black lines against the pink flesh tones in a way that shows the viewer an interior element of her psyche. Gothic symbolism is represented by heavy crosses that she bears, and a hint of the Gothic Fraktur black letter typescript of old. "Symphony for a Sacred Leaf" celebrates a leaf placed in the midst of mystical energy fields, to the accompaniment of musical measures woven into the field.

Anne Rudder continues her discovery into the depths of existence expressed in complementary words and color. In a poem a "Divine Particle" arises from a sacred flame in communion with the soul of the "one."

In "Everywhere Leaves" **Arlene Finger** takes us into a grisaille dream of plant leaves flying out of their pots to dance in the air.

Marie Robison's "Rima" looks as if she's coming to us in a dream, her face floating out of clouds of color, with extremely vivid eyes that seem to be asking a question. There is a great sense of mystery about her.

In three very different paintings **Dammika D. Ranasinghe** shows us new variations of her distinctly individual style of pattern painting. In "Reflection of a Sea Anemone" the stylized leaves float above a sea bottom, looking almost human-like, it's a very intriguing figure. In "Spiritual Happiness" human figures dressed in red robes file through a dense forest making their way to a source of light in the distance. The figures are on three planes, one group treading the ground, another starting to rise above them, and a third group already in the heights of the trees. "Humming Bees" is a pattern painting in a somewhat looser style than we've seen in the past so that there's a sense of buzzing movement of the purple abstract bees hovering over colorful flowers.



Dear Fellow Members and Friends of the West Side Arts Coalition, On April 1st, the Broadway Mall Community Center which contains our Gallery was closed down by the City of New York for an indefinite amount of time.

Probably most of you know that there have been some horrendous traffic deaths and injuries recently at the intersection of 96th St. and Broadway. To ameliorate the situation, the NYC Traffic Dept. did a traffic study there and the result was that they will reconfigure the plaza in front of the Broadway Mall Center Building. There will be major construction on the plaza outside the Mall for the next several weeks and the city has not told us how long it will be. Until they have completed the construction, the Broadway Mall Community Center is closed. No one is allowed in and that includes our landlady!

I know this is a great shock to all of you as it was to me and the rest of the Acting Board. The city has assured us that we will reopen but they have not given us a date yet. We will keep after them about it!

What does all of this mean for the members of the West Side Arts Coalition? The current Fine Arts Show, "Dreams and Reflections," beautifully curated by Daniel and Silvia Soares Boyer, will resume when the Center reopens. We will let everyone know when that will be.

The Annual Meeting, which would have been held on April 28th will be postponed. We will send out a communication to everyone about the results of the election, once the ballots are counted after April 15th. We just have to delay our annual get-together.

As far as the rest of this season is concerned, we are working on contingency plans to have shows until the end of June/beginning of July and we will keep you posted on what will be happening.

I thank all of you for your continued support, loyalty, understanding and sharing of your great talents and time with us and we hope you will bear with this situation and with us. Our future is bright. The West Side Arts Coalition will prevail. It's just that we have a small detour on the road to great exhibits. Once the construction is done, we will be able to be back in our beloved gallery.
