Salon Show 2016

A Fine Arts, Photography, & Crafts/MultiMedia Exhibit

The WSAC ended the 2015-16 season with an exhibit fitting for July 4th fireworks. Twenty-seven painters, sculptors and photographers graced our walls with their exciting endeavors, expanding horizons and bringing pleasure to all.

Georgianna Grantham presents her artistic abilities with new freedom, particularly evident in her acrylic painting, "A Gift to You." Originally a fabric artist of structured color and form, she has become an expressive abstractionist, allowing her brushstrokes to flow and run across the canvas surface with strength and vibrancy.

Deborah Yaffe creates "The Red Boat," a watercolor and gouache work of economical composition that almost turns the surface of the piece into a lovely abstraction. Although small with understated color, the painting has the feeling of a larger painting due to the artist's knowledgeable rendering.

In "Rainwalk in NY," acrylic on paper, **Carole Barlowe** paints a figurative group with subtle modulations of grays, making the mists almost palpable. Barlowe's art revolves around her simplified drawings of people, placed in abstracted space, where she emphasizes their psychological characteristics, creating arch commentary.

Richard Carlson's "Untitled #95" gives us intimations of Richard Diebenkorn's "Ocean Park" series in the applications of complementary blues and oranges, but adding a remark to the abstraction through ghostly lettering.

Jia Chen utilizes her personal sense of satire in her paintings, adeptly shown in a maelstrom of impasto colors in "The Carnival," where a facial configuration, perhaps autobiographical, breaks through in dark blue gestural lines on the thick surface, reminiscent of Jean Dubuffet's work.

Susan Rosen seems to mine Milton Avery's style and feeling in "Family Outing," creating an intimate, colorful beach scene of parents tenderly helping their young son play with a pail in the sand. Detail is obscured by the simplified painting of the figures, making emotion paramount. (Continued on Page 2)

Marianne V. McNamara provides droll commentary using a strong sense of pattern, while still realistically rendering the human subjects, as in her oil, "What We see a group of aged baby boomer men, sitting in a diner, reminiscing about their youthful glory days, adding poignancy to the piece as all the subjects represent her deceased uncles.

In "The Red Beret," **Mikki Powell** follows the maxim, "less is more," where she simplifies the features of the boy in the painting, drawing the viewer into his expressive, vulnerable gaze in a face framed by a luxuriant crimson hat.

Elizabeth K. Hill paints a joyous acrylic of riotous colors in her work, "Pentecost." The flames of the Holy Spirit fill the painting with power and the people respond, jubilantly, speaking in tongues in prayerful direct conversation with the deity.

Nate Ladson explores the metaphysical and spiritual in his oil, "A View from the Other Side,": where the rope bridge fades off into the distance of the vanishing point, mesmerizing the viewer, allowing a vision into eternity.

Cornelius Mead's photograph, "Catskill Mts. – Kaaterskill Falls, NY," shows his subtle, expert eye for nature. The falls delicately cascade down the right half of the picture in muted shadows against the light filled gushes of water, contrasting with the vibrant autumn colors on the left, creating a sense of simultaneous peace and drama. of simultaneous peace and drama.

Daniel Rossiter catches a beautiful pastiche of leaves in his photo, "Autumn Debris," where nature's detritus on the forest floor glistens with warm, vibrant colors, regally dressing the fallen leaves

Margo Mead's examination of environmental destruction continues in her mythological painting, "Birdman of Easter Island #2," where form morphs into an avian entity, contrasted with Easter Island's more realistic rocks, sea bird, and ocean. She compositionally paints her pictures in quadrants, with a limited palette, juxtaposing each section in masterful cohesion. masterful cohesion.

Myrna Harrison-Changar sensitively captures a room in Madrid in her photo, "Lavender Blue, Madrid," where complementary purples and yellows shimmer in faceted geometric forms and luminous cool colors, creating a monumental semi-abstract contrasting with the picture's small physical dimensions.

Stephen Lewis, in "Bleccheroni: Remembrance of Things Pasta," sends up Proustian gustatory reveling where the subject matter, pasta, becomes both the bowl and its contents. His exquisite obsessions with food are negated by the black macaroni of this piece, destroying the viewer's delicious fantasies of Italian cuisine.

Eleanor Mill's watercolor is redolent of the sun as she delicately captures the light of Nantes with a limited palette, applying pigment washes with subtle brushstrokes and perceptive drawing, all the while demonstrating great control and a compositionally strong sense of perspective.

Linda Lessner, a consummate interpreter of nature in her oils, provides great pleasure by handling her signature blues and greens with aplomb where the luminous color mesmerizes and turns the landscape into ethereal, semi-abstraction, in "Near Mt. Mohodnock, N.H."

Gloria Rosenberg's "Untitled," acrylic on canvas, balances anthropomorphic circular forms of facial

and fruit indications, with angular areas in the picture plane, perfectly fitting greens in an integrated composition.

Deborah Holcombe creates humorous work here in "Finished," emphatically depicting an empty soda fountain glass complete with straw, making the viewer aware that someone has just enjoyed a delicious beverage, definitively draining the drink to its last, exquisite drop.

Herb Fogelson's digital print of "Our Lady of the Immaculate Reception," brings a hilarious commentary on Catholic theology where the traditional Blessed Virgin shrine is contrasted with a huge satellite dish, putting modern radio wave frequencies in the same category as the energy of divine interpention. divine intervention.

Dennis Wunderlin's digital print "Chaise" is an depicting this summer leisure chair through carefully chosen forms that dance across the surface. The animated marks felicitously gesture to the viewer, thoroughly delighting.

Meg Boe Birns celebrates tribal ritual in her Latin snake-like forms of "Olé Grandfather Segundo" and also "Uno" where these colorful, mythic creatures remind me of staffs rattled by wise, old shamans who use magic to cast and cure spells.

Amy Rosenfeld continues to grow in this energetic collage melding black and gray curvilinear forms with colorful, superimposed geometrics. She manages to create compositional harmony through two disparate forms of expression in "Color 3D."

Jessica Anderson's acrylic, "Green Pastures," painterly, bold, and highly expressive in brushwork, demonstrates knowledgeable handling of white to create billowing clouds moving over a windswept sun-filled field, allowing the viewer to imagine running across grasslands in bracing air.

Daniel C. Boyer makes a historical political statement in his acrylic, "Michigan Irredenta," referencing the 1835 Toledo War, a boundary dispute between the state of Ohio and the Michigan Territory, which ended in a casualty-free stalemate. A compromise, the "Frostbitten Convention," allowed MI to receive statehood in exchange for giving up the disputed area, while acquiring most of the Upper Peninsula, previously mostly Native American territory.

Natasha Gurulous's tevtile wall coults to the proper state of the properties.

Natasha Guruleva's textile wall sculpture, "Deconstruction," is reminiscent of children's stuffed toys, here in fanciful forms referencing colorful anime, can be taken apart, becoming individual dolls. On the cynical level of adult experience, the stuffed toys remind this viewer of mushrooms in Disney's "Fantasia," alluding to the 1960's drug culture.

Silvia Soares Boyer explores the contrast of good and evil in her mixed media work, "The Mythical World of Pandora Goddess II," where the goddess, filled with light, allows darkness into the earthly world, with the supreme golden ratio of the metallic pentagram, the cosmological source of virtue, and Venus-like beauty. S. Boyer is an optimist, highlighting Pandora's safekeeping of hope, and emphasizes this belief in her uplifting use of composition.

This year's Salon Show was truly a tour-de-force with broad ranging subjects, successfully curated, keeping this viewer engaged by superb imagery, and looking forward to more work by so many talented people.

Margarita Ballester's "Untitled I" and "Untitled II" are abstracts of depth, the paintings seem to go back indefinitely, taking

The flowers and greenery in Clare Stokolosa's two gardens and three studies of tulips have such a lushness of color, making a strong impression on the eye.

Liz Rudey's four skillful lino-cut prints of birds are stylized yet they are realistically placed in their environments so that they seem to be living.

Frieda Christofides' garden bursts with plant life, and two abstracts of plants use color very subtly. The fourth watercolor gives the sense of the vitality of the Ft. Green corner.

Phil DeSantis has made architecture his subject, specifically features of the old buildings of New York; each watercolor is beautifully vibrant showing details of the buildings.

Lisa Kaplan's six compositions all vary as to subject, and with the exception of a lovely red flower, they are tightly constructed abstracts that will cause each viewer to contemplate and interpret individually.

Peter Salwen's oil paintings of two New York

Peter Salwen's oil paintings of two New York gardens bring to life the freshness of early

spring, the sun-filled East River promenade, and the delight of pigeons wheeling overhead in a mass of light.

Susan Greenstein's watercolors of the parks of New York shine with their beauty and contrast the solidity of buildings and the life of nature.

Rene Barkett's watercolors show an interesting use of verticals to highlight an unusual park fountain and a delightful carousel. An iris in acrylic is bursting with energy out of its frame.

Adrienne Cosner's two interesting acrylics of the Highline focus on the view of surrounding buildings, and a view of Old Quebec brings out all its charm.

Petronia Paley shows five very different paintings. Her focus is on people, using shape and color either sparingly or in a detailed way. Some are essentially abstracts and others are figurative, all are imaginative and unique.

Carol Rickey obviously likes food and spiriting a levely combination. She shows two

painting, a lovely combination. She shows two still-life compositions, very skillfully done, with a subtle use of color. The third painting, 16 doughnuts set out in order, is luscious.
