Nate Ladson's oil on canvas is highly meditative with a man walking in the woods at a tranquil hour as the forest shadows dissolve in twilight.

Lisa Kaplan's two small pieces are unique media viewpoints, the subjects transformed into almost tactile depictions in delightful blues and greens.

Joyce Weidenaar presents a wonderful oil on canvas of a boatman navigating the Pai River in Myanmar where the long wooden craft crosses the body of water, the shores framing the man's arduous task in lush vegetation.

Georgianna Grantham captures two views of the Wards Island Bridge at different times of the year in digital prints documenting the scene she observes from her apartment window.

Linda Lessner's exquisite painting of scenery upstate in her oil on canvas allows the viewer to almost breathe in the country air through lush verdant greens against a china blue sky in the piece she entitles "Meadow."

Judith Van Camp pleases our eyes with a kaleidoscope of rainbow colors in her acrylics depicting roses and an atmospheric semi-abstract rendering of delicate leaves.

Xenia Garamvolgyi paints a glorious canvas of English roses in full red and white blooms, voluptuously saturating the canvas surface.

Dennis Wunderlin provides us another aspect of his prodigious talent in two pencil/ wash drawings of people where he masters the skills of portraiture, departing from his more well-known abstract collages. Nancy Johnson provides us with her impressions of small town America with a charming main street painted in many shades of blues.

Daniel C. Boyer deforms the painting of General Comte de Lasalle from the Napoleonic Wars as a commentary that the conflict was for naught in the end due to Napoleon's final defeat and exile.

Nina Hellman creates two masterful encaustic pieces of cerulean pastel shades where subtle light pulsates from the sky in both with birds silhouetted in flight as if the time is of a Shakespearean dream.

In **Margo Mead**'s powerful painting, "Undone," an acrylic on canvas, humanity flees a tidal wave cataclysm, the artist underscoring that humankind is being pulled apart by the horror of climate change.

Carole Barlowe's sense of humor shines through in her two interpretations of our city with circumspect people on an urban street, the mammoth buildings rising around them along with a rendering of passengers in their own worlds on the subway.

Elizabeth K. Hill paints a magnificent angel in swirling colors emanating from the golden form on the canvas where the hues are almost bejeweled signifying a divine spirt of the first order.

The clouds and waves in Herb Fogelson's photos billow voluptuously giving new meaning to complimentary blues and oranges of cotton candy puffed nimbuses and towering waters.

Marianne McNamara's subjects are from the commedia dell'arte interpreted through a personal lens where girlfriends are clowns and the couple hiding behind masks are preparing to attend an expensive function they may prefer to skip.

Silvia Soares Boyer again uses media to examine Pandora, the goddess who opened humanity up to a world of woes, depicting the mythical spirit in blue and providing us with her interpretation of harlequins accompanied by an original melody.

In Sonia Barnett's work we see two aspects of the artist's talents, one a touching painting of a mother helping to arrange her daughter's hair as she dresses for a dance along with an abstract in the same palette hues intimating gyrating dancers stomping their enjoyment at a club.

Amy Rosenfeld regales us with a mixed media collage of exuberant words about living and enjoying life she has clipped from newspapers and magazines and placed on a rosy pastel optimistic canvas.

It was a great privilege to view this year's Salon Show and I look forward to many more wonderful creative endeavors when we resume in the fall. Have a beautiful summer!

(Cont'd from Page 1) David Reibman's and E. Genevieve William's styles contrast dramatically, hence the title of the show, "Duality". "Duality" narrates the artists' distinguishable approaches to storytelling. David's inquisitive images feature human subjects in their context. Genevieve's work has the absence of human presence.

Reibman's photographic compositions capture people and their accoutrements in public spaces. Using a technique he terms "molage," the stories of his subjects emerge in multiple images that show the progression of time within an architectural context. His images may seem like life's mundane moments, but, as the spectator gets closer, the depth of his storytelling acumen is apparent.

Williams uses everyday materials to create her work. These materials, already artifacts that attest human existence, gain a new life as collages that she brought to this exhibition. They describe not only our perceptions of light and memory, but also a velvety darkness filled with beauty and mystery. Genevieve's work can have the quality of a forensic dig that registers what ceased to exist.

David Reibman's 2018 chromogenic photos were the first ones that I observed, as I was making my way through the gallery. He uses his creativity in unique angled and overlapping layouts, as if I were seing a 3-D novel. People and buildings showcase elements arranged in triplicate subject

matter, delighting the viewer with whimsical pictures of Halloween ("Rest In Peace," "Mummies," "Science," "Freeze," "Free Hugz!"), colourful 'Come On Come All' circus ("Dinosaur Double," "Zap!") and portraying New York City's life ("The Real Deal," "Wonder," and "Wake Up Dream Big"), all of that along with a vivid "David Image" with which he, uncommonly, signs.

As I continued on my way from the left to the right side of the gallery, E. Genevieve Williams made me fall for her multiplatform of storytelling. Her large pieces ("Rumble," "Blue Rain," "Overpass," "Red Ball," "Grasslands," "Sunny," "Forest," "Desert Moon," and "Desert Network" cross disciplines of truth and fiction. The contents that she is able to generate scatter boundaries and show a cultural collaborative system implemented. The delight of the soul also reaches a type of sweet solitude with her smaller but remarkable pieces: "Nature Inhale Pink," "Ikebana, Green," "Winter Storm," "Blood Prints," "Pink Sand," and "Forest, Red Sun". They seem to be tangible for pilgrims who seek peaceful nature. These collages of Genevieve Williams, all from the current year of 2019, happen to be part of a limited edition of ten archival paper in 100% cotton-rag prints.

As I was looking forward to this dual exhibition, I was curious as how both arts would interact at Broadway Mall Gallery. Together, they brought a new power to impress, which I immensely enjoyed!
